READ THIS FIRST . . .

The thought of studying the Bible can be intimidating. It's a big book. It's also a controversial book. One could wonder if there is any hope of understanding it. But be encouraged; it is not as time consuming as one might think to master the Bible's core message. Many people watch more hours of TV in one week than it takes the average person to complete this course.

This *CORRESPONDENCE COURSE* is based on the book, *THE STRANGER ON THE ROAD TO EMMAUS.* It is quite different than many other overviews of the Bible, so before you begin, here are a few pointers.

- 1. Learn one section at a time in the sequence it is written. This is not a Bible course in which you can jump around from one lesson to another. It is important that you read each chapter in *The Stranger* sequentially and then answer the accompanying correspondence questions *before* you move on to the next chapter.
- 2. The STRANGER ON THE ROAD TO EMMAUS is written as a story. You will get far more out of the course if you don't spread your reading time over too many days. Many can read the entire book and complete the correspondence course questions in a handful of evenings. The sooner you finish the entire course, the more the story will stick together in your mind.
- 3. Learn for the sake of *knowing* for yourself. The point of this course is to gain an understanding of the main theme of the Bible. Whether you believe it or not is entirely up to you.
- 4. Make sure you complete the course. To make a final judgment about the Bible's primary message without knowing the full story entails a high risk of drawing wrong conclusions.
- 5. In the early stages of the course, you may have an abundance of questions. Don't get sidetracked. Write them down, but save your questions for the end to be discussed with your teacher or course corrector. Most people find that many of their questions are answered in the process of completing the overview. *The Stranger Correspondence Course* will help you with your questions by giving you the big picture.
- 6. Don't be insulted if you find some questions too easy—it means you understand the material. Some of the questions can be a little tricky so read them carefully!

7. The content labeled **FOR FURTHER CONSIDERATION**, is optional. To complete these sections you will need a Bible that contains both the Old and New Testaments. Since the verses are taken from the Bible translation called the NEW INTERNATIONAL VERSION® NIV®, we would suggest you consider obtaining a copy of that translation.

Now, open *The Stranger on the Road to Emmaus*, read the Preface on page 1, and begin with Chapter One.



FOR FURTHER CONSIDERATION:

1. In ancient times, a prophet was a messenger who passed on God's words to the people. The message usually addressed aspects of daily living, but almost invariably, the prophet's message included things yet to come. This foretelling of the future had a practical aspect to it. It was a potent test to determine whether a prophet was genuine.

If what a prophet proclaims in the name of the LORD does not take place or come true, that is a message the LORD has not spoken. Deuteronomy 18:21

A prophet's message was validated by the accurate fulfillment of his prophecies. He had to be 100% correct—there was no room for error.

But a prophet who presumes to speak in my name anything I have not commanded him to say, or a prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, must be put to death. Deuteronomy 18:20

In other words, a prophet had to be 100% right or he was dead. Obviously such a system discouraged "would be" false prophets.
