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

The accompanying audio CD follows the text, word for word, and also includes songs that tie in with the story.

The Lamb includes a review section at the beginning of each lesson. Once children have the entire story in their minds, they enjoy listening to *The Lamb—Just the Story* without the reviews and breaks.

You can purchase this edition on DVD or as an audio CD. These discs are often given to all listeners, so that they can review the message over and over again at home. Do not use these products until after your student has gone through all the lessons.

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The Lamb PowerPoint®

1. Background to Content

The Bible's most important message is understandable at a very young age. In some ways, it's like a puzzle. If the pieces are fitted together properly, piece by piece, it makes sense. The key is understanding each piece, and knowing where each piece fits.

Two thousand years ago, after his death and resurrection, Jesus taught the central message of the Bible to two disciples on the road to Emmaus. He began his lesson in the first books of the Bible, and used them as a basis so the disciples could understand his *person* and *work*. What Jesus did is basic to all learning.

Build on the basics

To learn any new concept, the most effective way is to build from the foundation up—to move from the known to the unknown. In mathematics, you don't start little children in school by teaching them: $w(z) = w_0 \left[1 + \left(\frac{\lambda z}{\pi w_0^2} \right)^2 \right]^{1/2}$. Rather, you begin with: 1 apple + 1 apple = 2 apples, and move from the simple to the complex. If you skip fundamentals, even simple arithmetic will be confusing.

It's the same with the Bible. Careful attention needs to be given to laying solid foundations for every new concept taught. Don't rush. Strive for clarity of understanding and everything else will fall in place.

If this approach to learning is unfamiliar, then we would strongly recommend that you acquire the book, "...and beginning with Moses" —*learning to teach as Jesus taught*.

Don't compromise the message

The Lamb presents the Bible's core message without watering it down or avoiding issues. Even subjects such as sin and death are taught in an honest, head-on manner. At the same time, the child is not left hanging. Even the lesson dealing with death ends with hope.

The Bible is quite direct about what it has to say, so every effort has been made to avoid vagueness. Where the Bible demands a choice, that choice is clearly stated. In keeping with this, political correctness at the expense of the message has been avoided. Traditional use of the word *man*, for collective humanity, has been used as a simple step to clarity.

Keep it simple

To keep the narrative simple, the central teachings found in the Old Testament are clustered around two people, Adam and Eve. It was felt that to introduce many individuals would unnecessarily complicate the message for little children.

3. Planning Your Time

This PowerPoint® is designed around either five or ten lessons, each lesson having its own review questions.

A review is built in at the beginning of each lesson and questions are included at the end. The questions are found in this booklet under the lesson headings or can be printed off the CD.

Five Lesson Format: Teaching time for each chapter runs 8 to 12 minutes. It will take an additional 20 to 30 minutes to quiz your children. Total time per lesson for teaching and quizzing is 25 to 45 minutes. These lessons end with an additional two sections that are to be used per the instructions on those pages.

Ten Lesson Format: Teaching time for each lesson runs 4 to 6 minutes. It will take an additional 10 to 20 minutes to quiz your children. Total time per lesson for teaching and quizzing is 15 to 25 minutes. These lessons also end with the additional two sections.

4. Handling Questions

If your audience is large, consider dividing into smaller groups for the question time. Pdf files of the questions are provided on the CD. Permission is granted for printing these for use with this product.

You will want each child to be able to clearly express his or her understanding of the content. Make sure your students are clear before moving on in the story.

Children like quizzes. Though some will be happy to simply answer the questions at the end of each chapter, others may ask more. If you are unsure of an answer, don't guess. Be honest. Tell the child that you do not know but that you will find out.

In such a situation we would suggest you obtain a copy of the book, *The Stranger on the Road to Emmaus*. This book covers the Bible in greater detail (see page 160 for contact information if you wish to obtain a copy.) The progression used in *The Lamb* links it very naturally to this more detailed book. *The Stranger* will answer most questions that a child would pose.

5. Presenting the PowerPoint®

Two styles are provided for presenting these lessons.

A. For PowerPoint® or Question sheets, insert the CD into a computer CD-ROM to access the files.

1. Copy the PowerPoint® files to your hard drive and open the lesson (either the Five Lesson or Ten Lesson files.) Then, using two good narrators, read the accompanying booklet to the audience while a third individual advances the slides at the appropriate time. Please remember to delete the files when you are finished—these can only be on one machine.

A book has been provided for each reader. The third copy is for the PowerPoint® operator.

This method allows for elaborating on the text where you feel it is necessary. *Do not clutter the message with additional thoughts that are not part of the story or "jump ahead" of the chronological sequence.*

Note: The text can be read by one reader, however two readers add greater interest and drama to the story. This booklet is designed for two readers.

2. Print the Adobe Acrobat® PDF files as needed—the Teacher's Handout is for use with students that are too young to write their own answers. The Student's Handout is for when you want the students to fill out the quizzes on their own.

B. For video, insert the DVD into a player or computer with a DVD-ROM and select one of three options:

1. Play the Ten Lessons as a video—complete with the narration. At the end of each lesson, the DVD will stop, allowing you to ask your students the questions.
2. Play the Five Lessons as above.
3. Play “Just the Story”—without review or interruption.

6. Knowing when to advance the pictures

The text in this book has been boldfaced and underlined to designate the point at which the PowerPoint® is advanced to the next picture. Each facet is revealed as the PowerPoint® is advanced. They are shown in this booklet as shown below.

We strongly recommend that you practice showing the PowerPoint® before giving the actual presentation. A poor performance will distract from the message.

Lesson One

God Made it All




Reader One:

The **Bible** is a very important letter¹ from God and is written directly to each one of us. That's right. The Bible says that God sent a very special message just to you.

Although the letter was written many years ago, what it has to say is just as important today as when it was first written.

Every boy and girl needs to know what the Bible says to them.

**Reader Two:**

The first pages in the Bible tell us that **God** was never born and he will never die.² His life had no beginning and it will never end. God has always been and will always be.

The Bible says that in the beginning, there was only God. There were no plants, animals or people. There was no earth, moon or sun. There were no other gods. Nothing!


Only God was alive in the beginning.

**Reader One:**

The Bible says that God made all the things we can see and all the things we cannot see.

One of the first things God did was to make **angels**. We cannot see angels, just like we cannot see God. Both angels and God are what we call *spirits*. They're like people,³ but they don't have bodies of muscle and bone.





The angels were made to be God's special messengers. They were to do what God asked.

All the angels watched and sang as God made the world.

Reader Two:



The Bible tells us that when God made the world, he did it in a very special way. When we make things, we need pencils, paper and scissors. Sometimes we make things using wood, nails and glue. At other times, we use a needle and thread.



But the Bible says that when God made the world, he didn't use any tools at all.



God just spoke—and there it was!




Reader One:

God said, "Let there be light!" And do you know what? Just like that, light appeared in the darkness.



The Bible says that God made everything we see simply by speaking words out of his mouth. God has so much power—he can do anything!



Reader Two:

The Bible tells us that God made the sun, moon and stars. He placed them in the sky exactly where he wanted them. God could do that because he is everywhere.

We should be happy to know that God is everywhere. This means he can be with you, and at the same time he can be with your family and friends no matter how far away they go or where they live.

That is just how big and great God is.

**Reader One:**

The Bible says that God made the world in six days. Only God could do that.

He made the food we eat, the air we breathe and the water we drink. He made the rivers, oceans and mountains. God made all the trees and flowers.

**Reader Two:**

God made the fish that swim in the sea. He made minnows and whales, crabs and seahorses.

**Reader One:**

God made the birds that fly in the sky. Whether big or small, he made them all.





Reader Two:

God made the **animals** that slither and crawl, walk and hop. Tiny or tall, fast or slow, the Bible tells us that God created them all.



Reader One:

Last of all, God made **people**, both man and woman. Their names were Adam and Eve. God loved them and cared for them. He made a perfect garden full of all sorts of trees, flowers and tame animals—just for them—so that they could enjoy all that he had made.

God would come and visit Adam and Eve. They would walk together in the garden. They were very close friends. Can you imagine that? Walking and talking with the Creator.

What do you think they talked about?



Reader Two:

When we look at the wonderful **world** God made, we can see that God is very powerful and knows how to do everything. Only such a God could make the amazing world we live in.



The **Bible** says that God is everywhere at the same time.

God knows and understands all things—God even knows the thoughts we think.

Reader One:

Because God made everything, he owns everything.

When you draw a **picture**, it belongs to you. Whether you make something out of wood, paper or cloth—you own it because you made it. It's the same way with God.



Because God made **everything**, it all belongs to him. This is why God is also called *Lord*. It means that he is the *King* or *Owner* of all that he has made.

God created it, so he owns it.

**Reader Two:**


The **Bible** tells us that God is good and very kind.

Just look at all the **beautiful** things that the Lord created. God could have made all flowers to be black and white, but instead he made them in pretty colors. God could have made all food taste horrible, but instead he made it good to eat and it smells wonderful. He made all sorts of fruits and flowers, bugs and butterflies, colors and sounds—just so that we could enjoy them.



God did this because he cares for us. God loves us.





Reader One:

The **Bible** also tells us that the Lord likes things done in a right way.



Wouldn't it be confusing if one day the sun set in the middle of the morning and didn't rise again for three days? Think how long you'd have to stay in bed! That's why God made rules. He made a rule for the sun—it was to rise in the morning and go down in the evening. It was to do that every day without changing.

God made rules or laws so that everything would fit together and the world would work in the right way.

Reader Two:

God made rules for people too, so that we could live happy lives.

Sometimes we don't like rules, but just stop and think for a moment what the world would be like without them. **If** there were no traffic lights, no stop signs and no speed limits, you wouldn't know when it was safe to cross the street. Everyone would be confused and upset. Without rules or laws, life would be difficult and dangerous.



God made rules because he knows what is best for us. He knows that when things are done in a right way, we are happy.

God cares for us.



Reader One:

Everything God made was perfect. When we say something is perfect, we mean that there is nothing wrong with it. It is good in every way. God created a perfect world because that's the way he is. He is perfect.⁴

God never does anything wrong.

**Reader Two:**

God's home is perfect. It's called Heaven.

The Bible tells us that Heaven is very beautiful. It's like a huge park with trees and a river. Right in the middle of this park is a wonderful, clean, safe city where nothing is broken or ever wears out. This city is so amazing even the streets are paved with gold.

In Heaven, there is no sickness, sadness or death. There are no weeds, thorns or thistles. No bad or unkind people live there. Everyone is always very, very happy. Heaven is full of beautiful music. The animals are tame and friendly. You never have to sleep in Heaven. There's no darkness or night—it is always day.

Heaven is a perfect place, where perfect people and perfect angels live with a perfect God. It is so wonderful, it's hard to describe.

Imagine being able to take a peek into Heaven.

What do you think it would be like to live there?

Lesson Two

A Wrong Choice



Reader One:

The **Bible** says that God is very powerful. He knows everything.

Just by speaking, he **created** the whole world and everything in it. God made it **perfect**.

God gave rules so that everything would know how to work in the **right** way. The sun knew when to get up and when to go to bed. Even the angels and the people were given rules so that they would know how to live and what to do. God gave rules so that everyone could be happy.


God likes everything to be pure, clean and safe because he is perfect. **Heaven** is a perfect place because God lives there. That is how God wants everything to be.

Reader Two:

After God had finished making his **perfect** earth, something terrible happened.

God's most important **angel** became unhappy. This angel's name was Lucifer. God had created him to do a very special job, but Lucifer began to think that he deserved something better.

Lucifer decided that he didn't want to be an angel anymore. He wouldn't follow God's rules. He'd make his own rules. He'd be in charge. He'd be the boss. Lucifer decided that he deserved to be God!



He talked many other angels into fighting against the Lord. Lucifer and his disobedient angels hated God and wanted to ruin everything.

They made Heaven a very unhappy place.

Reader One:

The Bible uses a special word to describe Lucifer's choice to disobey God and be a bad angel. It is called *sin*.

To sin means to decide not to live God's perfect way.

Bad thoughts and doing wrong things are ways of telling the Lord that you think you know better than him—that you're smarter than God. That is sin.

Sin always spoils things.

Reader Two:

When a person does something wrong, he shouldn't get away with it. He should expect to be punished. That is the way life should be—it's only fair.

It's not fair when someone is cruel and is never punished. It's not right that people get away with being mean or nasty. God doesn't like that. He punishes all wrong with just the right amount of punishment. It's never too little and never too much.

He is always fair.

Reader One:

Because God is perfect, he could not have these bad angels living with him in his perfect home. They were spoiling Heaven.



So God **threw** them out and told them never to come back.⁵ God changed Lucifer's name to *Satan*, which means *enemy*.

Satan was now an enemy of God.

Reader Two:

God made a **new** home for these bad angels. This home was created just for them and it fitted them perfectly. Because these angels were being terrible and bad, this new home was terrible and bad. Because these angels were being hurtful and unhappy, this new home was a place of hurt and unhappiness. This new home was an awful place called the *Lake of Fire*.

Those who live in this home live there forever and ever. It is a place of punishment for Satan and his very bad angels.⁶

Reader One:

Many angels followed Satan in disobeying God, but a lot **more** angels kept on obeying God and being his special messengers.

These good angels live and serve God in **Heaven**.

What sort of jobs do you think God asks these good angels to do?





Reader One:

When God first made the world, it was just like Heaven. There was no crying, hurting or being afraid. There were no bad or unkind people. No one stole, lied or killed. There was no sin of any kind. Above all, nothing ever died.

The world God made was a wonderful place to live. It was the way God wanted things to be. It was perfect.

Reader Two:

The people God created were also perfect. Only perfect people can live with a perfect God.

The first man was named Adam, and his wife was called Eve. The Lord loved them and made a beautiful garden for them to enjoy. It was full of animals and birds, rivers and streams, flowers and trees. Many of the trees were loaded with tasty fruit.

God allowed Adam and Eve to go anywhere they wanted, and eat anything they liked, except for one thing.

Reader One:

God told them not to eat the fruit from one special tree. If Adam and Eve disobeyed that one rule, and ate fruit from that one tree, then they would die.

Not being allowed to eat from that special tree wasn't hard for Adam and Eve. There were lots and lots of fruit trees in the garden. But by obeying God, Adam and Eve showed the Lord that they believed him. They were trusting that he knew what was best. That's all God wanted them to do—just believe what he said. It was like God was saying, *Trust Me*.



So that's the way it was in the beginning—perfect people trusting a perfect God and enjoying a perfect world.⁷



Reader Two:

But then Satan, that very bad and cruel angel, visited Adam and Eve in the beautiful garden. He told Adam and Eve that God was hiding something good from them. Satan said that if they ate the fruit from the special tree, then they would be just like God.



What should Adam and Eve do? Was Satan telling the truth or was he lying to them? If they believed Satan, they'd eat the fruit. But if they believed God, they wouldn't. Who should they believe—God or Satan? Who should they trust?

Reader One:

Do you know what? Adam and Eve began to think that being perfect people in God's perfect garden wasn't such a great thing after all. They wanted more. They wanted to be like God. So they did the one thing that God told them not to do—they ate the fruit.



Adam and Eve believed Satan's lie. They felt that Satan knew better than God what was good for them. They broke God's one simple rule. They took sides with Satan against God.



Isn't that sad? When people don't do what God asks them to do, it always brings sadness.





Reader Two:

When Adam and Eve disobeyed God's one rule, the whole world changed. It was no longer safe and perfect. Weeds and thorns grew out of the ground. The animals started to kill each other. The world became a scary place, full of selfishness, sickness and sadness—a place of death.

Sin always spoils things—it ruined God's perfect world. It destroyed the special friendship God had with Adam and Eve.

Adam and Eve thought that they were choosing what was best, but their choice to disobey God ruined everything.

Reader One:

God told Adam and Eve that because they had sinned, their bodies would someday stop working. They would die.



Have you ever wondered why people die? The Bible says that death came into the world because of Adam and Eve's sin.

Death is a horrible thing. When someone dies, it means that the real them no longer lives on earth. They have gone, never to return. That's why when you go to a funeral, people are sad. Their friend has gone. They feel all alone. They cry and really hurt inside. That is what the Bible means when it talks about death. It means you are separated from a friend.

Reader Two:

When Adam and Eve joined Satan's side, they were separated from their friend. They were separated from God. The friendship was over. It was gone. They felt all alone. They must have cried and hurt inside. It was very, very sad. Adam and Eve were separated from their best friend.


But as if that wasn't bad enough, because they had joined Satan, when their bodies died, they would have to go and live in his terrible home. Adam and Eve would be separated from God forever! This was such sad news, it was like a second death. Adam and Eve must have felt terrible.

Reader One:

But then God told Adam and Eve some really good news. The Bible says that God loved them so much that he made a way for them to be perfect again. If they came to God his way, God would allow them to live in Heaven.

So Adam and Eve had a choice. They could come God's way and live forever in God's perfect home in Heaven, or they could ignore God's way and live forever in Satan's terrible home. There were no other choices—only perfect people can live with a perfect God.



Lesson Three

Who to Trust



Reader One:

When God first made the world, it was a perfect place, just like Heaven. The **people** God made were also perfect because only perfect people can live with a perfect God. God loved Adam and Eve. He was their closest friend.

Reader Two:

But then **Satan** visited Adam and Eve in the garden. He told them a lie. He said they could be just like God. Adam and Eve believed Satan—they joined his side against God. They sinned.

The Bible says that sin brings **death**. Adam and Eve's bodies would grow old and die.

After they died, they would go and live with Satan and his angels in their **terrible** home. This is so awful—it's like another death. The Bible calls it the *Second Death*.

Sin always brings lots of sadness.

Reader One:

God didn't want Adam and Eve to go and live with Satan. He loved Adam and Eve. But they couldn't live in Heaven—they weren't perfect anymore. They had chosen to be sinners by believing Satan. What could God do?

God wasn't stuck! He had a plan. He told Adam and Eve just a little of his plan—and what **they** heard was very good news.



God promised to send a special man to earth. This man would be able to save Adam and Eve from being punished for their sin—he could save them from the *Second Death*. He'd be called a *Savior*.

How the Savior would rescue Adam and Eve and make them perfect again, God didn't say. But he had promised. Would Adam and Eve believe God this time? Would they trust him?

Reader Two:

Do you know what the word *trust* means? Let me tell you a story.



One day John was walking beside the river with his Grandpa. He got a little too close to the riverbank. All of a sudden, his feet slipped out from underneath him and—SPLASH!—into the water he went. He spluttered to the surface and struggled as the water swept him downstream. He was really scared. The water was freezing cold. Because his clothes were wet, they were heavy—he felt himself sinking.



But then John's Grandpa waded into the water. He was a strong man and his feet were firmly planted on the bottom of the river. With his long arms reaching out to John, his Grandpa called out, "Here! Grab my hand. I'll save you. Just trust me."



Reader One:

What should John do?

If he believed his Grandpa, then he would grab his hand. If he didn't believe his Grandpa, then

he would have to struggle on his own. It was Grandpa or himself.

Who should he trust?

Reader Two:

John reached out and took his Grandpa's hand. He believed that his Grandpa would save him from drowning. John trusted him. He made the right choice.



This is the sort of choice God wanted Adam and Eve to make. He wanted them to trust him, believing that he would rescue them from Satan's terrible home.



Yes, God had a rescue plan. Would Adam and Eve trust him?*



The Lord hadn't told them everything about his plan or everything about the Savior—but he had made a promise. If people trusted God, believing his promise, when they died he would make them perfect again.⁹ Perfect people can live with God.



All they needed to do was to trust him. It was that simple.



Reader Two:

But there was still one big problem.





God couldn't make Adam and Eve perfect and let them go to Heaven without doing something about their sin. God cannot leave sin unpunished.



Adam and Eve had disobeyed God. They had joined Satan's side. Adam and Eve had sinned. God couldn't pretend that this had never happened. He couldn't ignore it. That would not be right or fair. All wrong must be punished.

But how could God punish Adam and Eve's sin and not punish them?



That's a very important question. You see, just as Adam and Eve had sin that needed to be punished, so we all do. All boys and girls, all moms and dads—everyone who's born into this world does wrong things. We all sin. We're just like Adam and Eve.



Everyone needs to know how God can punish sin without punishing people.

Reader One:

So God explained a little bit more of his plan.

Because people didn't understand just how bad sin was—God asked them to do something that would help them understand. This would show them how sin could be punished without punishing people.



God told them to find an animal—a lamb. The lamb had to be a male lamb, which is a boy lamb. It could have nothing wrong with it. It could not be sick or crippled—its wool could not be falling out. It had to be perfect.

They were to bring the lamb to an altar, a special place of death. The one bringing the lamb was to put his hand on its head. God said that if he did this, God would look at it as if all the man's sin was being placed on the lamb.

Reader Two:

But now something very sad had to happen.

Remember how death came into the world because of sin? Well, because the lamb now had the man's sin, it had to die. The man who brought the lamb had to kill it. This helped people to see that it was the man's sin which put the lamb to death.

God asked people to do this, so that they could understand his plan—how he would punish sin without punishing people. The lamb was punished instead of the man.¹⁰

The man did what God said because he trusted God. He believed that the lamb was punished in his place. When the man died, God would make him perfect and he could live in Heaven.

Aren't you glad that God had a plan? It's just one way of showing us that he loves us.

Lesson Four

The Promised Savior



Reader One:

When God first made the world, it was a perfect place.

But then Adam and Eve **disobeyed** God. They joined Satan's side. The world changed and became a place of sin and death. The Bible says that **death** happened because of sin.

But God loved Adam and Eve—he loves all people. He didn't want people to be punished for their sin. So God promised that one day he would send a Savior. Anyone who wanted to be saved from the sadness that sin brings could be rescued. The Savior could even save them from the **Second** Death. All they needed to do was **trust** God. Then he would make them perfect so that they could live forever in Heaven.

This was very good news.

Reader Two:

But God couldn't ignore **people's** sin and pretend it had never happened. All wrong still had to be punished. So God asked them to do something that would help them understand his plan—how he would punish sin without punishing people.





God asked people to bring a **perfect** male lamb to an altar. The one bringing the lamb put his hand on its head—showing that his sin was being placed on the lamb. It was as if all the sin was being moved from the man—onto the lamb. **Because** the lamb now carried all the man's sin—the man had no sin left.¹⁰ It was as if he was perfect. And do you know what? Perfect people can live with a perfect God in his **perfect** home.

Reader One:

But remember how all sin must be **punished**?

Well, because the lamb now had the man's sin, it had to **die**—that's because death is the punishment for sin. The lamb died in the man's place. The lamb was punished instead of the man.

Reader Two:

But some people didn't believe God's plan. They even told others that God's plan could not be right. The idea of trusting God to be made perfect—that was just too simple. They felt they needed to do something more. So they came up with their own plan—they made their own rules.

They said that if they did more **good** things than bad things, then God would be happy. If they were kind, and did right—then they'd be good enough to live in Heaven.

But do you know what? These people didn't understand how good they would have to be to live with God in his perfect Heaven.

Reader One:

So God explained some things.

He said that if they stole something, no matter how little—they weren't good enough for Heaven.

God told them that if they loved stuff like money or things more than him—then they weren't perfect.

He said that if they ever lost their temper—that was sin.




If they ever told a lie, even just a little lie—then they weren't perfect. It was a sin to tell lies.

God said that if they talked back to their mother or father, even just once—they were no longer perfect.

Only perfect people can live with a perfect God.

Reader Two:

Altogether God gave the people ten rules. They were called the Ten Commandments. To make sure that no one would forget his commands, the Lord wrote the rules on two flat stones called tablets. Because they were written on stone, no one could add their own rules or rub one out. God's rules never change.





The Lord gave the stone tablets to a man by the name of **Moses**. Moses was to show all the people what God had written.

Everyone needed to understand that no matter how hard they tried, they could never obey God’s ten rules perfectly. They could never be good enough to live with God. They were sinners. They couldn’t save themselves from the punishment their sin deserved.

They needed a Savior—they needed a lamb.

Reader Two:



For years, the people **looked** forward to the day when the Savior would arrive. While they waited, God told them to do something that would help them to see how sin could be punished without punishing them.



God asked them to bring a **perfect** lamb to an altar. The one bringing the lamb put his hand on its head—showing that his sin was being moved onto the lamb. The lamb then had to **die**—as death is the punishment for sin.¹⁰



The lamb died in the man's place. This showed people how God could punish sin without punishing them.



So that's the way it was. For many long years, people looked forward to the coming Savior. They **wondered** who he might be. What was his name? How would he come? How would he save them?

Reader One:

Finally, the day arrived. The **Savior** came to earth! And do you know what? It turned out that the Savior was God Himself. That's right, God came to **earth**. Isn't that amazing?

To be the Savior, God became a **man**. This doesn't mean that he stopped being God, but the Lord knew that the only way to save us, was to become like us. So he came as a little baby, just like any other boy or girl arrives on earth.

He was born into a very ordinary family. His mother was called **Mary** and her husband's name was **Joseph**.

Though the family was ordinary, the **baby** was not. The baby was God Himself.




Reader Two:

The Lord was not born as a baby in a hospital. He was born in a **stable**—a place where sheep and little lambs are sheltered.

His first visitors were shepherds—men who care for lambs and make sure that they come to no harm.

When God came to earth, he was called *Jesus*. The name Jesus means *God is the one who saves*.

Jesus was the Savior that God had promised to Adam and Eve long ago. He came to save us from the punishment our sin deserves.





Reader One:

Jesus did many wonderful things while he was on earth—amazing things that don't normally happen.

He made blind men see, so that they wouldn't stumble and fall. He healed those who could not walk, so that they could run and play. Jesus brought a little girl back to life, so that all her friends would be happy again. He fed a huge crowd with a small boy's lunch, so that no one would be hungry.

Jesus did all these things so that people would know that he was God. He loved people.



Reader Two:

One night when some of Jesus' friends were traveling by boat across a big lake, they were caught in an awful storm. The wind was fierce and huge waves crashed against the side of the boat.

All night long the men tried to row the boat to shore, but the wind was too strong. It was almost morning when the men saw someone walking on top of the water. They thought it was a ghost! They were very scared.

Then a voice called out to them, "It's me, don't be afraid." It was Jesus!

Peter, one of the men in the boat, shouted to Jesus, "If it's you, tell me to come to you on top of the water."



Jesus said, "Come."

Peter got out of the boat and began to walk to Jesus.

Reader One:

But when Peter saw the wind and waves, he became afraid and began to sink. What should he do? He could struggle on his own or he could call out to Jesus to save him. Who should he trust?

Peter saw that he couldn't save himself—Jesus was the only one who could rescue him. **He** cried out, "Lord, save me!" Jesus reached out his hand, and caught Peter. Peter made the right choice.

Just as Peter could not save himself from drowning, so we can't save ourselves from being punished for our sin. We need a savior.

Jesus is our Savior. We need to trust him.



Lesson Five

Our Perfect Lamb



Reader One:

Back at the beginning of time when **Adam** and Eve first sinned, God promised that one day he would send a special man, called *a Savior*. The Savior would save people from the **Second** Death and the sadness that sin brings.

When the time came for the **Savior** to arrive, God Himself left Heaven to come to earth. The Creator God was the Savior. His name was Jesus, which means, **God** is the one who saves.

Reader Two:

Jesus lived on the **earth**—visiting friends, working, eating food, sleeping, travelling to many places—just like any other man. But Jesus was also very different from you and me. Jesus never did anything wrong.

All the time he lived on earth, even as a little boy, he never did one bad thing, not even the smallest thing. Jesus was the only man who ever lived a perfect life—who never sinned.

Because **Jesus** lived a perfect life, he had no sin to be punished. He did not need to die. People only die because of sin and Jesus never sinned.



Reader One:

Although Jesus didn't have to die, he told people that one day men would take him, beat him and nail him to a wooden cross to kill him. Jesus would die. After being dead for three days, he would come back to life.

Those who heard him say this didn't believe it. They told him not to talk that way.

But what Jesus was saying was true. He was telling his friends the rest of God's plan—he was telling them good news.

Reader Two:

It was all about God's promise—it was all about the lamb.

Do you remember the lamb? How people had to bring one?

Now, Jesus was being called the Lamb of God.

Remember how the lamb had to be a male lamb?



Well, Jesus was a man.

Do you remember how the lamb had to be perfect?

Well, Jesus was perfect. He never sinned.

Reader One:

Remember how the lamb was to be brought to an altar, a special place of death?



Well, after Jesus had been on earth for a while, he allowed men to bring him to a **cross**, a special place of death.

And do you remember how the **one** bringing the lamb put his hand on its head—showing that his sin was being placed on the lamb?


The Bible says that when **Jesus** was nailed to the cross, all our sin was taken off us and placed on him. He took everybody's **sin**—from the best people to the very worst men and women—the sin of every boy, girl, mom and dad was moved on to Jesus.

All the **nasty** things that had ever been said, he heard. All the **terrible** things that had ever been done, he knew. All the anger that had ever been shown, he saw.

All the **hurt** that had ever been caused, he felt. All of sin's horrible dirtiness was placed on the perfect Jesus. He felt it all, he knew it all, he took it all. It must have been terrible.

Yes, it all had to do with a **lamb**.


Jesus was the Lamb—our **Lamb**.





Reader Two:

But think back to the rest of the story. Do you remember what happened to the **lamb**? Because sin must be punished, and death is the punishment for sin—the lamb had to die.



It was the same way with **Jesus**.

Because all our sin had been moved onto him, he had to be punished—Jesus had to die.



The Bible says that **Jesus** died in our place. He took all the punishment our sin deserved, so that we would never need to suffer the *Second Death*.

Jesus was the final lamb—no more lambs needed to be brought to an altar. Jesus had done it all.

God had kept his promise.

Reader Two:

Now, if the story ended with Jesus dead on the cross, it would be terribly sad.

But the Bible tells us more. It says that after Jesus died, his friends carefully took his body down from the cross. They must have been broken-hearted. They put him in a special grave called a **tomb**. Slowly, they rolled a big stone across the door. Then, sadly they turned and went home.



The next day, the men who had killed Jesus told soldiers to guard the tomb. They had heard that Jesus had said that he would come back to life after three days. They didn't want anyone coming

and taking Jesus' body away and pretending he was alive. They wanted to make sure Jesus stayed dead in the tomb.

Reader One:

But the soldiers couldn't stop God. The big stone couldn't stop God. Nothing could stop God's plan. Just as he had said, after three days Jesus came back to life! He was alive!

The guards fell down in fear. An angel rolled back the stone—everyone could see that Jesus was no longer in the grave. For forty days, he met with his friends and large groups of people. Everyone was excited. He was with them again—talking, eating and traveling. It was wonderful!

Jesus was alive!

Reader Two:

People could hardly believe it. No one had ever done this before. No one had died and brought himself back to life. What amazing power!

Jesus was showing them that because he was stronger than death, people didn't need to be afraid of dying and going to be with Satan in his horrible home. They didn't need to be afraid of the *Second Death*.



Jesus was strong enough to bring them back to life. But he wouldn't bring them back to life on earth—a place that has been spoiled by sin. He would bring them back to life in Heaven—a place that is perfect and full of happiness.

Jesus was promising to do this for anyone who believed that he was their Lamb.

Reader One:

Now this is very important. Did you hear what Jesus was saying? Do you understand?

He was saying that if a boy, girl, mom or dad—if anyone believed that Jesus died in their place, then they could go and live with him in Heaven.

It was just that simple.

All they needed to do was believe that Jesus was their Lamb—that he had been punished for their sin. If they trusted him, believing that what he said was true, then when that boy, girl, mom or dad—when they finished living here on earth—Jesus would make them perfect so that they could live with him in Heaven.



Reader Two:

The people listened excitedly. This was news everyone needed to hear. They talked for long hours with Jesus about the plan. And then, at the end of forty days, **Jesus** said goodbye and returned to Heaven. That is where he lives now, in his perfect home.

And that's what the Bible is all about. It's a letter from God—full of love—and it's all about the Lamb.

Note to Teacher: The goal of these questions is to determine whether the learner is trusting in the Lord alone for salvation from sin. It should be noted that the prayer is a prayer of thanks, and is prayed after the child has expressed faith. Praying a prayer does not "save" anyone. Salvation is based on simple belief or faith in God as a person, and in the fact that he has taken care of our sin problem.

For more background on the "content of faith," please order the DVD "What's in a Name." Available from GOODSEED.

If you have answered all the questions correctly, it means you understand God's plan. It means you know what God's letter is saying. That is very important. Many people live until they are very old and still do not understand what the Bible is all about.

To understand God's letter is a very good thing, but there is one big question you need to answer. The big question is this: *Do you believe what God said is true?* You see, it's one thing to understand the Bible, it's another thing to believe it.

Try answering these questions. They will help you to know if you believe God's letter.

- Who do you believe Jesus is? Is he just a nice man, or is he more than that? **He is God.**
- What about you—do you believe you're good enough for Heaven, or that you are a sinner? **I am a sinner.**
- Do you believe that God will ignore your sin, or that your sin needs to be punished? **It needs to be punished.**
- Who was punished in your place? **Jesus**
- Who do you believe is your Lamb? **Jesus**
- After Jesus died, he came back to life and now he lives forever. Do you believe that? **Yes**

If you have answered these questions correctly and believe them to be true, the punishment for your sin is all gone. It is just that simple. You will never have to be afraid of the *Second Death* or the *Lake of Fire*. Because you have believed what God said is true, you are trusting him—you are now on God's side. He promises never to leave you. He will always be with you, no matter where you go or what you do.

When you finish living here on earth, God says he will make you perfect for Heaven—you will live forever with Him.⁹ That's what God says. Do you think God really means that?

This is something you can be very happy about right now. It is something you can know for sure because God said it, and God does not tell lies.

Perhaps this book has answered questions you've wondered about. God has written lots of things to help us. You can discover more in his letter to us. The Bible is full of answers.

When someone does something special for you, you thank him. The Bible says that we can talk to the Lord anytime just like one friend talks to another. Here are some words to say *thank you* to Jesus for what he did for you. Listen to them a couple times and then in your own words, you thank him. Remember God is everywhere. He is listening.

Dear Jesus, I trust you. You are the only one who can save me. I am a sinner. I believe you took my punishment. You died in my place. Thank you for loving me so much. I know you will keep your promise to take me to Heaven to be with you.

Jesus is a wonderful Savior.

Lesson One

God Made it All




Reader One:

The **Bible** is a very important letter¹ from God and is written directly to each one of us. That's right. The Bible says that God sent a very special message just to you.

Although the letter was written many years ago, what it has to say is just as important today as when it was first written.

Every boy and girl needs to know what the Bible says to them.

**Reader Two:**

The first pages in the Bible tell us that **God** was never born and he will never die.² His life had no beginning and it will never end. God has always been and will always be.

The Bible says that in the beginning, there was only God. There were no plants, animals or people. There was no earth, moon or sun. There were no other gods. Nothing!


Only God was alive in the beginning.

**Reader One:**

The Bible says that God made all the things we can see and all the things we cannot see.

One of the first things God did was to make **angels**. We cannot see angels, just like we cannot see God. Both angels and God are what we call *spirits*. They're like people,³ but they don't have bodies of muscle and bone.





The angels were made to be God's special messengers. They were to do what God asked.

All the angels watched and sang as God made the world.

Reader Two:



The Bible tells us that when God made the world, he did it in a very special way. When we make things, we need pencils, paper and scissors. Sometimes we make things using wood, nails and glue. At other times, we use a needle and thread.



But the Bible says that when God made the world, he didn't use any tools at all.



God just spoke—and there it was!




Reader One:

God said, "Let there be light!" And do you know what? Just like that, light appeared in the darkness.



The Bible says that God made everything we see simply by speaking words out of his mouth. God has so much power—he can do anything!



Reader Two:

The Bible tells us that God made the sun, moon and stars. He placed them in the sky exactly where he wanted them. God could do that because he is everywhere.

We should be happy to know that God is everywhere. This means he can be with you, and at the same time he can be with your family and friends no matter how far away they go or where they live.

That is just how big and great God is.

**Reader One:**

The Bible says that God made the world in six days. Only God could do that.

He made the food we eat, the air we breathe and the water we drink. He made the rivers, oceans and mountains. God made all the trees and flowers.

**Reader Two:**

God made the fish that swim in the sea. He made minnows and whales, crabs and seahorses.

**Reader One:**

God made the birds that fly in the sky. Whether big or small, he made them all.





Reader Two:

God made the animals that slither and crawl, walk and hop. Tiny or tall, fast or slow, the Bible tells us that God created them all.



Reader One:

Last of all, God made people, both man and woman. Their names were Adam and Eve. God loved them and cared for them. He made a perfect garden full of all sorts of trees, flowers and tame animals—just for them—so that they could enjoy all that he had made.

God would come and visit Adam and Eve. They would walk together in the garden. They were very close friends. Can you imagine that? Walking and talking with the Creator.

Lesson Two

What God is Like



Reader One:

When we look at the wonderful **world** God made, we can see that God is very powerful and knows how to do everything. Only such a God could make the amazing world we live in.

The **Bible** says that God is everywhere at the same time.

God knows and understands all things—God even knows the thoughts we think.

**Reader Two:**

Because God made everything, he owns everything.

When you draw a **picture**, it belongs to you. Whether you make something out of wood, paper or cloth—you own it because you made it. It's the same way with God.




Because God made **everything**, it all belongs to him. This is why God is also called *Lord*. It means that he is the *King* or *Owner* of all that he has made.

God created it, so he owns it.

**Reader One:**

The **Bible** tells us that God is good and very kind.





Just look at all the **beautiful** things that the Lord created. God could have made all flowers to be black and white, but instead he made them in pretty colors. God could have made all food taste horrible, but instead he made it good to eat and it smells wonderful. He made all sorts of fruits and flowers, bugs and butterflies, colors and sounds—just so that we could enjoy them.



God did this because he cares for us. God loves us.



Reader Two:

The **Bible** also tells us that the Lord likes things done in a right way.



Wouldn't it be confusing if one day the sun set in the middle of the morning and didn't rise again for three days? Think how long you'd have to stay in bed! That's why God made rules. He made a rule for the sun—it was to rise in the morning and go down in the evening. It was to do that every day without changing.

God made rules or laws so that everything would fit together and the world would work in the right way.

Reader One:

God made rules for people too, so that we could live happy lives.

Sometimes we don't like rules, but just stop and think for a moment what the world would be like without them. **If** there were no traffic lights, no stop signs and no speed limits, you wouldn't know when it was safe to cross the street. Everyone would be confused and upset. Without rules or laws, life would be difficult and dangerous.

God made rules because he knows what is best for us. He knows that when things are done in a right way, we are happy.

God cares for us.

Reader Two:

Everything God made was perfect. When we say something is perfect, we mean that there is nothing wrong with it. It is good in every way. God created a **perfect** world because that's the way he is. He is perfect.⁴

God never does anything wrong.

Reader One:

God's home is perfect. It's called **Heaven**.

The Bible tells us that Heaven is very beautiful. It's like a huge park with trees and a river. Right in the middle of this park is a wonderful, clean, safe city where nothing is broken or ever wears out. This city is so amazing even the streets are paved with gold.



In Heaven, there is no sickness, sadness or death. There are no weeds, thorns or thistles. No bad or unkind people live there. Everyone is always very, very happy. Heaven is full of beautiful music. The animals are tame and friendly. You never have to sleep in Heaven. There's no darkness or night—it is always day.

Heaven is a perfect place, where perfect people and perfect angels live with a perfect God. It is so wonderful, it's hard to describe.

Imagine being able to take a peek into Heaven.

Lesson Three

The Bad Angels



Reader One:

The **Bible** says that God is very powerful. He knows everything.

Just by speaking, he **created** the whole world and everything in it. God made it **perfect**.

God gave rules so that everything would know how to work in the **right** way. The sun knew when to get up and when to go to bed. Even the angels and the people were given rules so that they would know how to live and what to do. God gave rules so that everyone could be happy.



God likes everything to be pure, clean and safe because he is perfect. **Heaven** is a perfect place because God lives there. That is how God wants everything to be.

Reader Two:

After God had finished making his **perfect** earth, something terrible happened.

God's most important **angel** became unhappy. This angel's name was Lucifer. God had created him to do a very special job, but Lucifer began to think that he deserved something better.

Lucifer decided that he didn't want to be an angel anymore. He wouldn't follow God's rules. He'd make his own rules. He'd be in charge. He'd be the boss. Lucifer decided that he deserved to be God!



He talked many other angels into fighting against the Lord. Lucifer and his disobedient angels hated God and wanted to ruin everything.

They made Heaven a very unhappy place.

Reader One:

The Bible uses a special word to describe Lucifer's choice to disobey God and be a bad angel. It is called *sin*.

To sin means to decide not to live God's perfect way.

Bad thoughts and doing wrong things are ways of telling the Lord that you think you know better than him—that you're smarter than God. That is sin.

Sin always spoils things.

Reader Two:


When a person does something wrong, he shouldn't get away with it. He should expect to be punished. That is the way life should be—it's only fair.

It's not fair when someone is cruel and is never punished. It's not right that people get away with being mean or nasty. God doesn't like that. He punishes all wrong with just the right amount of punishment. It's never too little and never too much.

He is always fair.

Reader One:

Because God is perfect, he could not have these bad angels living with him in his perfect home. They were spoiling Heaven.



So God **threw** them out and told them never to come back.⁵ God changed Lucifer's name to *Satan*, which means *enemy*.

Satan was now an enemy of God.

Reader Two:

God made a **new** home for these bad angels. This home was created just for them and it fitted them perfectly. Because these angels were being terrible and bad, this new home was terrible and bad. Because these angels were being hurtful and unhappy, this new home was a place of hurt and unhappiness. This new home was an awful place called the *Lake of Fire*.

Those who live in this home live there forever and ever. It is a place of punishment for Satan and his very bad angels.⁶

Reader One:

Many angels followed Satan in disobeying God, but a lot **more** angels kept on obeying God and being his special messengers.

These good angels live and serve God in **Heaven**.

Lesson Four

A Wrong Choice



Reader One:

When God first made the **world**, it was just like Heaven. There was no crying, hurting or being afraid. There were no bad or unkind people. No one stole, lied or killed. There was no sin of any kind. Above all, nothing ever died.

The world God made was a wonderful place to live. It was the way God wanted things to be. It was perfect.

**Reader Two:**

The **people** God created were also perfect. Only perfect people can live with a perfect God.

The first man was named Adam, and his wife was called Eve. The Lord loved them and made a beautiful garden for them to enjoy. It was full of animals and birds, rivers and streams, flowers and trees. Many of the trees were loaded with tasty fruit.

God allowed Adam and Eve to go anywhere they wanted, and eat anything they liked, except for one thing.

**Reader One:**

God told them not to eat the fruit from one special tree. If Adam and Eve disobeyed that one rule, and ate fruit from that one tree, then they would die.



Not being allowed to eat from that special tree wasn't hard for Adam and Eve. There were lots and lots of fruit trees in the garden. But by obeying God, Adam and Eve showed the Lord that they believed him. They were trusting that he knew what was best. That's all God wanted them to do—just believe what he said. It was like God was saying, *Trust Me*.



So that's the way it was in the beginning—perfect people trusting a perfect God and enjoying a perfect world.⁷

Reader Two:

But then **Satan**, that very bad and cruel angel, visited Adam and Eve in the beautiful garden. He told Adam and Eve that God was hiding something good from them. Satan said that if they ate the fruit from the special tree, then they would be just like God.

What should Adam and Eve do? Was Satan telling the truth or was he lying to them? If they believed Satan, they'd eat the fruit. But if they believed God, they wouldn't. Who should they believe—God or Satan? Who should they trust?



Reader One:

Do you know what? **Adam** and Eve began to think that being perfect people in God's perfect garden wasn't such a great thing after all. They wanted more. They wanted to be like God. So they did the one thing that God told them not to do—they **ate** the fruit.



Adam and Eve believed Satan's lie. They felt that Satan knew better than God what was good for them. They broke God's one simple rule. They took sides with Satan against God.

Isn't that sad? When people don't do what God asks them to do, it always brings sadness.

Reader Two:

When Adam and Eve disobeyed God's one rule, the whole world changed. It was no longer safe and perfect. Weeds and thorns grew out of the ground. The animals started to kill each other. The world became a scary place, full of selfishness, sickness and sadness—a place of death.


Sin always spoils things—it ruined God's perfect world. It destroyed the special friendship God had with Adam and Eve.

Adam and Eve thought that they were choosing what was best, but their choice to disobey God ruined everything.

Reader One:

God told Adam and Eve that because they had sinned, their bodies would someday stop working. They would die.

Have you ever wondered why people die? The Bible says that death came into the world because of Adam and Eve's sin.



Death is a horrible thing. When someone dies, it means that the real them no longer lives on earth. They have gone, never to return. That's why when you go to a funeral, people are sad. Their friend has gone. They feel all alone. They cry and really hurt inside. That is what the Bible means when it talks about death. It means you are separated from a friend.

Reader Two:

When Adam and Eve joined Satan's side, they were separated from their friend. They were **separated** from God. The friendship was over. It was gone. They felt all alone. They must have cried and hurt inside. It was very, very sad. Adam and Eve were separated from their best friend.

But as if that wasn't bad enough, because they had joined Satan, when their bodies died, they would have to go and live in his terrible home. Adam and Eve would be separated from God forever! This was such sad news, it was like a second death. Adam and Eve must have felt terrible.

Reader One:

But then **God** told Adam and Eve some really good news. The Bible says that God loved them so much that he made a way for them to be perfect again. If they came to God his way, God would allow them to live in Heaven.



So Adam and Eve had a choice. They could come God's way and live forever in God's perfect home in **Heaven**, or they could ignore God's way and live forever in Satan's terrible **home**. There were no other choices—only perfect people can live with a perfect God.



Lesson Five

Who to Trust



Reader One:

When God first made the world, it was a perfect place, just like Heaven. The **people** God made were also perfect because only perfect people can live with a perfect God. God loved Adam and Eve. He was their closest friend.

**Reader Two:**

But then **Satan** visited Adam and Eve in the garden. He told them a lie. He said they could be just like God. Adam and Eve believed Satan—they joined his side against God. They sinned.



The Bible says that sin brings **death**. Adam and Eve's bodies would grow old and die.



After they died, they would go and live with Satan and his angels in their **terrible** home. This is so awful—it's like another death. The Bible calls it the *Second Death*.



Sin always brings lots of sadness.

Reader One:

God didn't want Adam and Eve to go and live with Satan. He loved Adam and Eve. But they couldn't live in Heaven—they weren't perfect anymore. They had chosen to be sinners by believing Satan. What could God do?

God wasn't stuck! He had a plan. He told Adam and Eve just a little of his plan—and what **they** heard was very good news.



God promised to send a special man to earth. This man would be able to save Adam and Eve from being punished for their sin—he could save them from the *Second Death*. He'd be called a *Savior*.

How the Savior would rescue Adam and Eve and make them perfect again, God didn't say. But he had promised. Would Adam and Eve believe God this time? Would they trust him?

Reader Two:

Do you know what the word *trust* means? Let me tell you a story.



One day John was walking beside the river with his Grandpa. He got a little too close to the riverbank. All of a sudden, his feet slipped out from underneath him and—SPLASH!—into the water he went. He spluttered to the surface and struggled as the water swept him downstream. He was really scared. The water was freezing cold. Because his clothes were wet, they were heavy—he felt himself sinking.



But then **John's** Grandpa waded into the water. He was a strong man and his feet were firmly planted on the bottom of the river. With his long arms reaching out to John, his Grandpa called out, "Here! Grab my hand. I'll save you. Just trust me."

Reader One:

What should **John** do?



If he believed his Grandpa, then he would grab his hand. If he didn't believe his Grandpa, then he would have to struggle on his own. It was Grandpa or himself.

Who should he trust?

Reader Two:

John reached out and took his Grandpa's hand. He believed that his Grandpa would save him from drowning. John trusted him. He made the right choice.

This is the sort of choice God wanted Adam and Eve to make. He wanted them to trust him, believing that he would rescue them from Satan's terrible home.


Yes, God had a rescue plan. Would Adam and Eve trust him?*

The Lord hadn't told them everything about his plan or everything about the Savior—but he had made a promise. If people trusted God, believing his promise, when they died he would make them perfect again.⁹ Perfect people can live with God.

All they needed to do was to trust him. It was that simple.

This was such good news that people began to look forward to the day when the Savior would come.

Lesson Six

The Rescue Plan



Reader One:

God created the world to be a perfect place, but when Adam and Eve decided that they didn't want to trust God anymore, the perfect world was spoiled. It became a place of sin.

The Bible tells us sin is what causes death. Sin always brings a lot of sadness.

But then God told Adam and Eve some really good news. He had a rescue plan. One day, he would send a Savior to save people from all the bad things that happened because of sin. He would free people from being on Satan's side—people could be on God's side again. God said that the Savior would even save people from the *Second Death*.

If people believed God, trusting what he said was true, then he would make them perfect.

Only perfect people can live in a perfect Heaven.


Reader Two:

But there was still one big problem.

God couldn't make Adam and Eve perfect and let them go to Heaven without doing something about their sin. God cannot leave sin unpunished.

Adam and Eve had disobeyed God. They had joined Satan's side. Adam and Eve had sinned. God couldn't pretend that this had never happened. He couldn't ignore it. That would not be right or fair. All wrong must be punished.





But how could God punish Adam and Eve's sin and not punish them?

That's a very important question. You see, just as Adam and Eve had sin that needed to be punished, so we all do. All **boys** and girls, all moms and dads—everyone who's born into this world does wrong things. We all sin. We're just like Adam and Eve.



Everyone needs to know how God can **punish** sin without punishing people.

Reader One:

So God explained a little bit more of his plan.

Because people didn't understand just how bad sin was—God asked them to do **something** that would help them understand. This would show them how sin could be punished without punishing people.



God told them to find an animal—a lamb. The lamb had to be a male lamb, which is a boy lamb. It could have nothing wrong with it. It could not be sick or crippled—its wool could not be falling out. It had to be perfect.

They were to bring the lamb to an altar, a special place of death. The one bringing the lamb was to put his hand on its head. God said that if he did this, God would look at it as if all the man's sin was being placed on the lamb.

Reader Two:

But now something very sad had to happen.

Remember how death came into the world because of sin? Well, because the lamb now had the man's sin, it had to **die**. The man who brought the lamb had to kill it. This helped people to see that it was the man's sin which put the lamb to death.

God asked people to do this, so that they could understand his plan—how he would punish sin without punishing people. The lamb was punished instead of the man.¹⁰

The man did what God said because he trusted God. He believed that the lamb was punished in his place. When the man died, God would make him perfect and he could live in **Heaven**.

Aren't you glad that God had a plan? It's just one way of showing us that he loves us.

Lesson Seven

Right and Wrong



Reader One:

When God first made the world, it was a perfect place.

But then Adam and Eve **disobeyed** God. They joined Satan's side. The world changed and became a place of sin and death. The Bible says that **death** happened because of sin.

But God loved Adam and Eve—he loves all people. He didn't want people to be punished for their sin. So God promised that one day he would send a Savior. Anyone who wanted to be saved from the sadness that sin brings could be rescued. The Savior could even save them from the **Second** Death. All they needed to do was **trust** God. Then he would make them perfect so that they could live forever in Heaven.

This was very good news.

Reader Two:

But God couldn't ignore **people's** sin and pretend it had never happened. All wrong still had to be punished. So God asked them to do something that would help them understand his plan—how he would punish sin without punishing people.





God asked people to bring a **perfect** male lamb to an altar. The one bringing the lamb put his hand on its head—showing that his sin was being placed on the lamb. It was as if all the sin was being moved from the man—onto the lamb. **Because** the lamb now carried all the man's sin—the man had no sin left. It was as if he was perfect.¹⁰ And do you know what? Perfect people can live with a perfect God in his **perfect** home.

Reader One:

But remember how all sin must be **punished**?

Well, because the lamb now had the man's sin, it had to **die**—that's because death is the punishment for sin. The lamb died in the man's place. The lamb was punished instead of the man.

Reader Two:

But some people didn't believe God's plan. They even told others that God's plan could not be right. The idea of trusting God to be made perfect—that was just too simple. They felt they needed to do something more. So they came up with their own plan—they made their own rules.

They said that if they did more **good** things than bad things, then God would be happy. If they were kind, and did right—then they'd be good enough to live in Heaven.

But do you know what? These people didn't understand how good they would have to be to live with God in his perfect Heaven.

Reader One:

So God explained some things.

He said that if they stole something, no matter how little—they weren't good enough for Heaven.

God told them that if they loved stuff like money or things more than him—then they weren't perfect.

He said that if they ever lost their temper—that was sin.

If they ever told a lie, even just a little lie—then they weren't perfect. It was a sin to tell lies.

God said that if they talked back to their mother or father, even just once—they were no longer perfect.

Only perfect people can live with a perfect God.

Reader Two:

Altogether God gave the people ten rules. They were called the Ten Commandments. To make sure that no one would forget his commands, the Lord wrote the rules on two flat stones called tablets. Because they were written on stone, no one could add their own rules or rub one out. God's rules never change.





The Lord gave the stone tablets to a man by the name of **Moses**. Moses was to show all the people what God had written.

Everyone needed to understand that no matter how hard they tried, they could never obey God's ten rules perfectly. They could never be good enough to live with God. They were sinners. They couldn't save themselves from the punishment their sin deserved.

They needed a Savior—they needed a lamb.

Lesson Eight

The Promised Savior



Reader One:

The **Bible** says that only perfect people can live with a perfect God. But people **aren't** perfect. Whether boy or girl, mom or dad, we all do **wrong**. Since it is only right that all sin is punished, it means that we have a problem. Because we sin, we too must be punished. This is **terrible** news.

But remember how God had some good news? Remember his plan? The Bible says that God would provide a Savior who would one day come to earth.


This Savior would **rescue** anyone who wanted to be saved from the punishment for their sin.

Reader Two:

For years, the people **looked** forward to the day when the Savior would arrive. While they waited, God told them to do something that would help them to see how sin could be punished without punishing them.

God asked them to bring a **perfect** lamb to an altar. The one bringing the lamb put his hand on its head—showing that his sin was being moved onto the lamb. The lamb then had to **die**—as death is the punishment for sin.¹⁰

The lamb died in the man's place. This showed people how God could punish sin without punishing them.





So that's the way it was. For many long years, people looked forward to the coming Savior. They **wondered** who he might be. What was his name? How would he come? How would he save them?

Reader One:



Finally, the day arrived. The **Savior** came to earth! And do you know what? It turned out that the Savior was God Himself. That's right, God came to **earth**. Isn't that amazing?




To be the Savior, God became a **man**. This doesn't mean that he stopped being God, but the Lord knew that the only way to save us, was to become like us. So he came as a little baby, just like any other boy or girl arrives on earth.



He was born into a very ordinary family. His mother was called **Mary** and her husband's name was **Joseph**.



Though the family was ordinary, the **baby** was not. The baby was God Himself.



Reader Two:




The Lord was not born as a baby in a hospital. He was born in a **stable**—a place where sheep and little lambs are sheltered.



His first visitors were shepherds—men who care for lambs and make sure that they come to no harm.

When God came to earth, he was called *Jesus*. The name Jesus means *God is the one who saves*.



Jesus was the Savior that God had promised to Adam and Eve long ago. He came to save us from the punishment our sin deserves.

Reader One:

Jesus did many wonderful things while he was on earth—**amazing** things that don't normally happen.

He made blind men see, so that they wouldn't stumble and fall. He healed those who could not walk, so that they could run and play. Jesus brought a little girl back to life, so that all her friends would be happy again. He fed a huge crowd with a small boy's lunch, so that no one would be hungry.

Jesus did all these things so that people would know that he was God. He loved people.

Reader Two:

One **night** when some of Jesus' friends were traveling by boat across a big lake, they were caught in an awful storm. The wind was fierce and huge waves crashed against the side of the boat.

All night long the men tried to row the boat to shore, but the wind was too strong. It was almost morning when the men saw **someone** walking on top of the water. They thought it was a ghost! They were very scared.

Then a voice called out to them, "It's me, don't be afraid." It was Jesus!



Peter, one of the men in the boat, shouted to Jesus, "If it's you, tell me to come to you on top of the water."

Jesus said, "Come."

Peter got out of the boat and began to walk to Jesus.

Reader One:

But when Peter saw the wind and waves, he became afraid and began to sink. What should he do? He could struggle on his own or he could call out to Jesus to save him. Who should he trust?

Peter saw that he couldn't save himself—Jesus was the only one who could rescue him. **He** cried out, "Lord, save me!" Jesus reached out his hand, and caught Peter. Peter made the right choice.

Just as Peter could not save himself from drowning, so we can't save ourselves from being punished for our sin. We need a savior.

Jesus is our Savior. We need to trust him.



Lesson Nine

Our Perfect Lamb



Reader One:

Back at the beginning of time when **Adam** and Eve first sinned, God promised that one day he would send a special man, called a *Savior*. The Savior would save people from the **Second Death** and the sadness that sin brings.

When the time came for the **Savior** to arrive, God Himself left Heaven to come to earth. The Creator God was the Savior. His name was Jesus, which means, **God** *is the one who saves*.

Reader Two:

Jesus lived on the **earth**—visiting friends, working, eating food, sleeping, travelling to many places—just like any other man. But Jesus was also very different from you and me. Jesus never did anything wrong.

All the time he lived on earth, even as a little boy, he never did one bad thing, not even the smallest thing. Jesus was the only man who ever lived a perfect life—who never sinned.

Because **Jesus** lived a perfect life, he had no sin to be punished. He did not need to die. People only die because of sin and Jesus never sinned.



Reader One:

Although Jesus didn't have to die, he told people that one day men would take him, beat him and nail him to a wooden cross to kill him. Jesus would die. After being dead for three days, he would come back to life.

Those who heard him say this didn't believe it. They told him not to talk that way.

But what Jesus was saying was true. He was telling his friends the rest of God's plan—he was telling them good news.

Reader Two:

It was all about God's promise—it was all about the lamb.

Do you remember the **lamb**? How people had to bring one?

*Now, **Jesus** was being called the Lamb of God.*

Remember how the lamb had to be a male lamb?

Well, Jesus was a man.

Do you remember how the lamb had to be perfect?

Well, Jesus was perfect. He never sinned.

Reader One:

Remember how the **lamb** was to be brought to an altar, a special place of death?



*Well, after Jesus had been on earth for a while, he allowed men to bring him to a **cross**, a special place of death.*

And do you remember how the **one** bringing the lamb put his hand on its head—showing that his sin was being placed on the lamb?

*The Bible says that when **Jesus** was nailed to the cross, all our **sin** was taken off us and placed on him. He took everybody's **sin**—from the best people to the very worst men and women—the sin of every boy, girl, mom and dad was moved on to Jesus.*

All the **nasty** things that had ever been said, he heard. All the **terrible** things that had ever been done, he knew. All the anger that had ever been shown, he saw.

All the **hurt** that had ever been caused, he felt. All of sin's horrible dirtiness was placed on the perfect Jesus. He felt it all, he knew it all, he took it all. It must have been terrible.


Yes, it all had to do with a **lamb**.

*Jesus was the Lamb—our **Lamb**.*



**Reader Two:**

But think back to the rest of the story. Do you remember what happened to the **lamb**? Because sin must be punished, and death is the punishment for sin—the lamb had to die.



It was the same way with **Jesus**.

Because all our sin had been moved onto him, he had to be punished—Jesus had to die.



The Bible says that **Jesus** died in our place. He took all the punishment our sin deserved, so that we would never need to suffer the Second Death.

Jesus was the final lamb—no more lambs needed to be brought to an altar. Jesus had done it all.

God had kept his promise.

Lesson Ten

Alive Forever



Reader One:

Many, many years ago, God promised a Savior who would come to save people from the punishment that sin brings. He would save people from the Second Death.

God told people to bring a lamb, so that he could show them how sin could be punished without punishing them.

Reader Two:

Now let's think. The people back then had to have a lamb. Do we have a lamb?

Yes, we do. Our lamb was Jesus.

He was called "the Lamb of God."

The lamb the people brought was perfect. Okay, listen. Who was the only person that ever lived a perfect life—that never sinned once?

That's right. It was Jesus. He's our perfect Lamb.

The people were to bring their lamb to an altar, a special place of death. What special place of death was Jesus taken to? Do you remember?

It was a wooden cross.



Now this is very important. Do you remember how all the sin of the people was placed on the lamb? Think carefully. Whose sin was placed on Jesus?

You're right. It was our sin.

Because the lamb now carried the people's sin, it had to die. Who died in our place?

Yes, it was Jesus. He died for us.



Reader One:

When Jesus was nailed to the cross, all the **sin** of every boy, girl, **mom** and dad was moved from them onto him. Because Jesus had no sin of his own to die for, he could die for someone else—he could die for us.

Our sin put Jesus to **death**.

He chose to be punished in our place, so that he could save us from the punishment our sin deserved.

Jesus is our **Savior**.

Reader Two:

Now, if the story ended with Jesus dead on the cross, it would be terribly sad.

But the Bible tells us more. It says that after Jesus died, his friends carefully took his body down from the cross. They must have been broken-hearted. They put him in a special grave called a **tomb**. Slowly, they rolled a big stone across the door. Then, sadly they turned and went home.



The next day, the men who had killed Jesus told soldiers to guard the tomb. They had heard that Jesus had said that he would come back to life after three days. They didn't want anyone coming and taking Jesus' body away and pretending he was alive. They wanted to make sure Jesus stayed dead in the tomb.

Reader One:

But the soldiers couldn't stop God. The big stone couldn't stop God. Nothing could stop God's plan. Just as he had said, after three days Jesus came back to life! He was **alive!**

The guards fell down in fear. An angel rolled back the stone—everyone could see that Jesus was no longer in the grave. For forty days, he met with his friends and large groups of people. Everyone was excited. He was with them again—talking, eating and traveling. It was wonderful!

Jesus was alive!

Reader Two:

People could hardly **believe** it. No one had ever done this before. No one had died and brought himself back to life. What amazing power!

Jesus was showing them that because he was stronger than death, people didn't need to be afraid of dying and going to be with Satan in his horrible home. They didn't need to be afraid of the *Second Death*.



Jesus was strong enough to bring them back to life. But he wouldn't bring them back to life on earth—a place that has been spoiled by sin. He would bring them back to life in Heaven—a place that is perfect and full of happiness.

Jesus was promising to do this for anyone who believed that he was their Lamb.




Reader One:

Reader Two:

And that's what the Bible is all about. It's a letter from God—full of love—and it's all about the Lamb.



Note to Teacher: The goal of these questions is to determine whether the learner is trusting in the Lord alone for salvation from sin. It should be noted that the prayer is a prayer of thanks, and is prayed after the child has expressed faith. Praying a prayer does not "save" anyone. Salvation is based on simple belief or faith in God as a person, and in the fact that he has taken care of our sin problem.

If you have answered all the questions correctly, it means you understand God's plan. It means you know what God's letter is saying. That is very important. Many people live until they are very old and still do not understand what the Bible is all about.

To understand God's letter is a very good thing, but there is one big question you need to answer. The big question is this: *Do you believe what God said is true?* You see, it's one thing to understand the Bible, it's another thing to believe it.

Try answering these questions. They will help you to know if you believe God's letter.

- Who do you believe Jesus is? Is he just a nice man, or is he more than that? **He is God.**
- What about you—do you believe you're good enough for Heaven, or that you are a sinner? **I am a sinner.**
- Do you believe that God will ignore your sin, or that your sin needs to be punished? **It needs to be punished.**
- Who was punished in your place? **Jesus**
- Who do you believe is your Lamb? **Jesus**
- After Jesus died, he came back to life and now he lives forever. Do you believe that? **Yes**

If you have answered these questions correctly and believe them to be true, the punishment for your sin is all gone. It is just that simple. You will never have to be afraid of the *Second Death* or the *Lake of Fire*. Because you have believed what God said is true, you are trusting him—you are now on God's side. He promises never to leave you. He will always be with you, no matter where you go or what you do.

When you finish living here on earth, God says he will make you perfect for Heaven—you will live forever with Him.⁹ That's what God says. Do you think God really means that?

This is something you can be very happy about right now. It is something you can know for sure because God said it, and God does not tell lies.

Perhaps this book has answered questions you've wondered about. God has written lots of things to help us. You can discover more in his letter to us. The Bible is full of answers.

When someone does something special for you, you thank him. The Bible says that we can talk to the Lord anytime just like one friend talks to another. Here are some words to say *thank you* to Jesus for what he did for you. Listen to them a couple times and then in your own words, you thank him. Remember God is everywhere. He is listening.

Dear Jesus, I trust you. You are the only one who can save me. I am a sinner. I believe you took my punishment. You died in my place. Thank you for loving me so much. I know you will keep your promise to take me to Heaven to be with you.

Jesus is a wonderful Savior.

Endnotes:

1. For the sake of simplicity we used the word 'letter' in the sense of 'communication from' rather than trying to define how God made the written scripture available to us.
2. As in the sense of 'God is eternal.'
3. In the sense that they are 'beings,' as opposed to being a 'force.'
4. 'Perfect' is being used both in its normal sense, and the fuller sense of God being holy and righteous, without sin.
5. 'Never come back' in the sense of 'for eternity.' Satan has access to Heaven to accuse believers before God, however without success.
6. The Bible is clear that Satan and his angels are not presently in this new home, but at a future date, they will be confined there. (Revelation 20:10). This book is not comprehensive enough to explain these facts. We felt more detail would open the door to questions that could sidetrack one from the purpose of this book.
7. This could be understood as being 'like God' as in the sense of possessing all His attributes, or being 'like God' but limited to only 'knowing good and evil.' The Scriptures do not explain whether Satan was offering specific information on a general temptation 'to be like God' or if his lie was limited to being like God in just one area ('be like God knowing good and evil'). Since to try and explain the concept of being 'like God knowing good and evil' would involve a lot of explanation not pertinent to the story, we left the option open as to what Satan was implying. Whatever the case, it was a lie.
8. In most cases, the conversations attributed to occurring between God and Adam and Eve, are found in the biblical text. However, in certain situations, we have 'read back' into the story certain truths that we find in the scripture, which are clearly articulated as applying to humanity in general. For example, the Bible says in reference to another Old Testament figure, that "Abram believed the LORD, and he credited it to him as righteousness." (Genesis 15:6) Since the Scripture is amply clear that 'faith' or 'trust' was the only way one could ever be 'righteous' before God, we have felt free to state those truths in the context of Adam and Eve without the complicating factor of introducing other biblical figures.
9. 'When they died' only states the conditional side of the biblical teaching known as 'justification.' The full teaching of 'justification' involves much more. When we put our trust in the Lord to be our Saviour, God credits righteousness to our account immediately, and looks upon us as being perfect even in the here and now. Because it is hard for children to understand how we can be considered perfect by God, when they know they are still being 'bad,' we have only endeavored to communicate the 'conditional' side of the teaching.
10. Since this book was written for children, necessity required ideas to be stated in concrete terms. I was often perplexed about how to communicate the symbolic nature of the sacrifice without losing my young audience. It may be helpful to those schooled in the scriptures to know that this book was built on an approach to teaching that attempts to create a sense of what people knew and felt at the time it was written. If you put yourself in the shoes of the Old Testament believer, you would not know that God would remove all sin on the cross. You probably would think of it as happening bit by bit at the altar. However, we know the Bible clearly teaches that, "...it is impossible for the blood of bulls and goats to take away sins." (Hebrews 10:4) Since we now know that the animal sacrifice was only a symbol of what was to come, I used the qualifying phrase "as if" to create the sense that sin was not removed by the animal sacrifice. It was only "as if" it had been removed. The actual removal occurred on the cross. Since I could not say "as if" in every sentence, one has to read the entire paragraph to get an accurate feel of what really was occurring.

How well do you understand the Bible?
